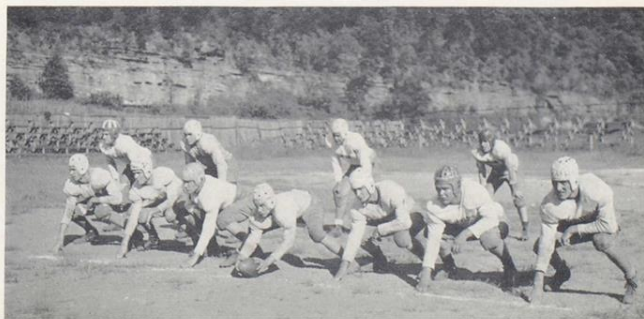
If ever Hinton High School football experienced an in-and-out off-again-on-again season, that season was 1939. One in a series of unpredictable gridiron years which began with the advent of John Clifford Worth as coach three years ago, 1939 claimed a special place in Bobcat history, a niche all its own for its particular "what-next?" complexion.

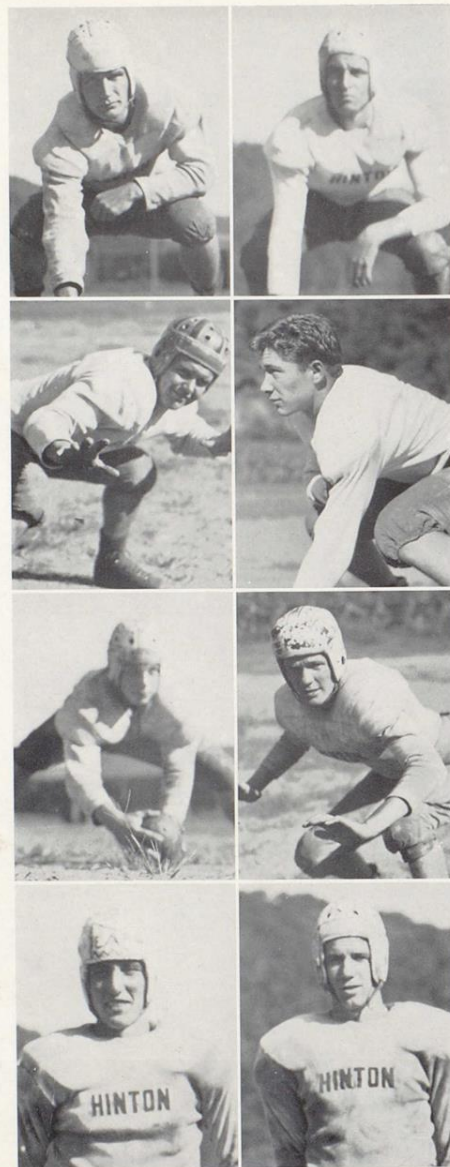
Nevertheless, in spite of its peculiarities, 1939 was another banner year for Hinton and Johnny Worth. It saw, in the order of their importance: (1) a 7-6 victory over Beckley; (2) a 0-0 tie with Charleston; (3) eight games out of ten won, one lost; and (4) the first invitation in Bobcat history to a post-season bowl game and a subsequent rousing victory in that same classic event.

To begin with, 1939 was down in the future books as an off-year. Eight of the 1938 regulars were gone; replacements coming up were young and unseasoned. Still, the opening gun of the season was the usual breeze. White Sulphur Springs fell, 26-0, as Hinton warmed up for the heavier firing to come.

The tip-off came when the Bobcats, underdogs to Charleston for the third successive year in spite of the victory and tie scored in the two previous years, stopped the heralded Mountain Lions again, 0-0. Hinton's loyal John Q. Fan took heart and rode high for the next four games.

Mount Hope followed Charleston and was set down 8-0; Mullens was beaten, 7-6, after a terrific struggle; Princeton was another breeze, 35-0. The October books were closed with a gleeful 40-0 romp over Covington, Va., the performance that eventually landed the Bobcats the bowl bid.

## THE 1939 BOBCATS

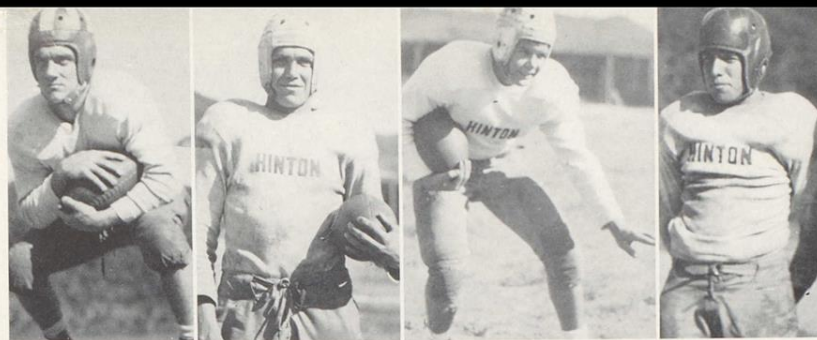
Abruptly the honeymoon was over. East Bank was coming up—East Bank, rated a genuine, triple-dipped terror on the trail of a state championship. November 10 will be passed over with the notation that East Bank won, 13-0. Be it noted also that it was contended by Bobcat defenders that the Hinton were back on their heels at the time, shy of the Pioneer reputation.

The East Bank debacle quickly became the lone black mark on that otherwise noteworthy record, and was the direct cause of what happened the next week. Welch, all unaware, stepped into the ring with the smarting, rebounding Bobcats and was flattened, 26-7.

Then — the ivy-covered, tradition-bound feud with Beckley, on the new Thanksgiving Day. Meanwhile, Johnny Worth received an invitation to meet Clifton Forge, Va., at Covington on November 30 in the First Annual Mountain States Charity Bowl game, and accepted.

Beckley, November 23, 1939: Hinton was favored again, but in view of the Bobcats' past performances in the role of favorite, the fact was generally not admitted. Here came the season's most noteworthy about-face. Thumbing their noses at the tradition which demands a spectacular, do-or-die fight against Beckley, the 1939 Bobcats scored a touchdown and a point early, then sat down. The Eagles scored, but missed the point, and Hinton squeezed by, 7-6.

Their seasonal chores in West Virginia done in a forthright manner, the Bobcats turned their guns on Virginia and whipped Clifton Forge, 19-7, in the Mountain Bowl.

Unquestionably, Paul "Poody" Phillips, halfback, was heart and soul of the 1939 Hinton team. For his sterling qualities as a triple-threat spark-plug and generally a good boy to have around, he won a berth on the All-Southern Conference team, not to mention sundry other all-this or all-that honors, and finally a second team position in the All-West Virginia selections. Besides Phillips were "Handy Andy" Williams, Basil Gill, Ralph Vass, Bill Bartgis and Shelby Allen, seniors, in the line; Dick Simms, "Blocking Buck" Harvey, Earl Meadows and Bob Johnson as backfield assistants; and also up front, Rob Vass, Earl Ailstock and Ray Phipps. Too, it was the first year on the Bobcat coaching staff for James H. (Buck) Porterfield, fresh from Summersville. Robert (Bun) Goff rounded out the board of strategy.

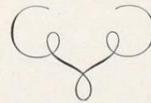

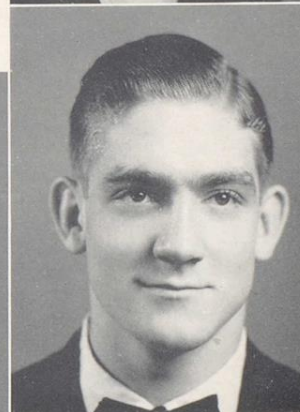

## CLASS TOURNEY

Hinton High School's first attempt at an inter-class basket-ball tournament, arranged by Athletic Director Johnny Worth the last week in March, met with gratifying success and rousing enthusiasm from the student body from the time practice began until the Sophomore Class teams, the Eighth Grade and the Ninth Grade "B" teams captured the championships in the finals on March 30.

Drills began about three weeks previous to the tournament, with students as coaches. Teams in the senior boys' tournament were under the tutelage of varsity basket-ball players, with Julian Meadows piloting the Seniors, Earl Ailstock the Juniors, Billy Bob Conner and Kenneth Harvey the Sophomores, Marshall Adams the Freshmen, Rob Vass the Eighth Grade and Manard Bruce the Seventh Grade.

In the four-team girls' tournament, the Seniors and Juniors were coached by Miss Bowmen. The Seventh and Eighth Grade teams competed in the senior boys' tourney and played in the final round for the Junior High championship, while two teams of younger boys in the Seventh and Ninth Grades made up the "B" tournament.

Play began at 1:00 p. m., on Friday, March 29, with the gymnasium bleachers divided into cheering sections for each class and each section decorated in the class colors. Every team was uniformed, many of them in a clever and original manner. The honor of opening the tournament went to the Seventh and Ninth Grade "B" teams, playing the first game of a three-game series for the "B" championship, and the Seventh won out, 6-4. In the second game the Senior girls defeated the Freshman girls, 20-2, and the session ended with a 17-11 win by the Sophomore boys over the Juniors, the victory that sent the Sophomores off on their march to the championship.

The Freshman boys scored a 15-10 triumph over the Seventh Grade in the opening game of the night session, then the Ninth Grade "B" team avenged itself for its defeat during the afternoon by downing the Seventh, 8-1. Starting their own campaign for the girls' throne, the championship-bound Sophomores turned back the Junior girls, 18-8, and in the concluding game of the first round the Senior boys won out over the Eighth Grade, 28-18.

Saturday afternoon in the girls' consolation final, the Juniors defeated the Freshmen, 24-18. The first game of the boys' semi-finals saw the Sophomores score their second victory, 42-14, over the Freshmen, then the Senior boys captured a place in the finals by



defeating by a score of 19-10 the Juniors, who were redrawn into the tournament, after their elimination by the Sophomores to make an even four-team semi-final round.

First championship team to be crowned was the Ninth Grade "B", which won the third and deciding game from Seventh "B", 14-12, as the final round began on Saturday night. Eighth Grade defeated the Seventh for the Junior High crown, 20-13, the Sophomore girls nosed out the Seniors, 16-12, to claim the title in the girls' division, and the strong Sophomore five swept the boys' championship by trimming the Seniors, 28-19.

Trophies were presented to the champions, all-tournament teams were chosen in both the boys' and girls' divisions, and prizes were awarded to outstanding players and coaches.

With this successful inauguration, the inter-class tournament became an institution at Hinton High School, and will be repeated annually on an increasingly larger scale.
