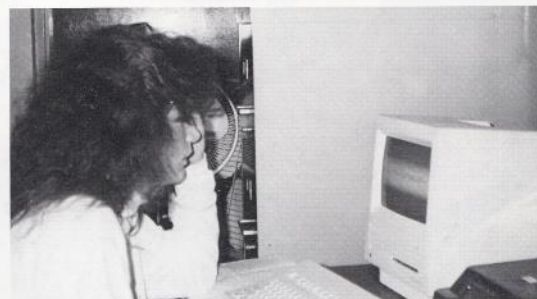
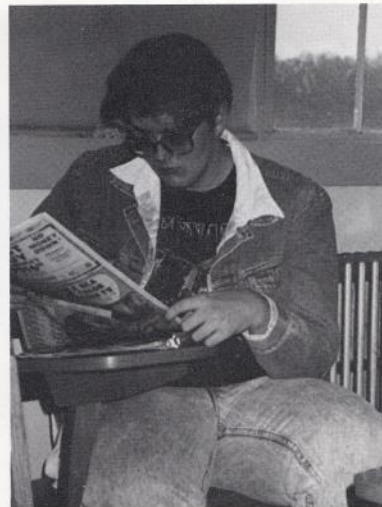

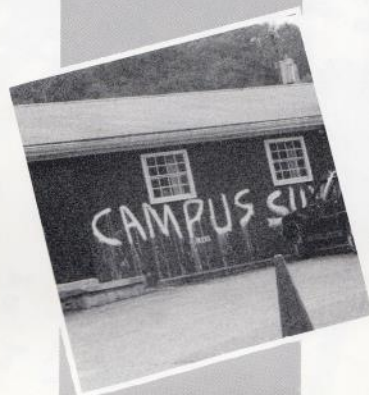

Jason has never had off-campus privileges, but says "When they made up these policies, they men-

tioned eleven kids who got drunk at lunch time. There were 500 kids going off campus, and when eleven got caught, they punished 489 kids."

Brandon explained, "My dad is one of the B. O. E. members who voted against closed campus. After all, we're not bad kids. The worst thing is, nobody will listen to our complaints, either."

Homecoming 1990

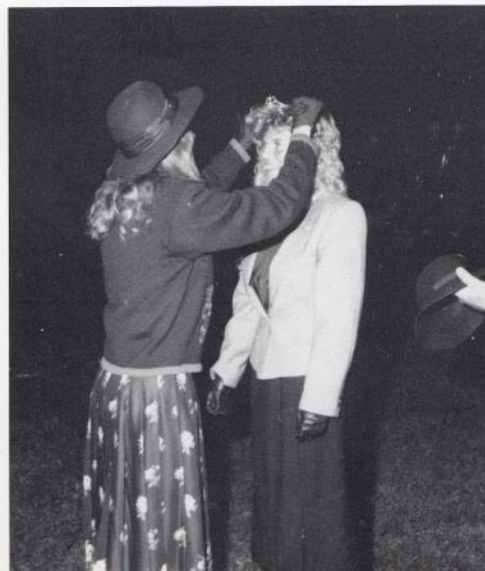
In 1987, Valerie Pack, Andi Gore, and Melissa Edwards were chosen as 9th grade candidates for Junior High Homecoming Queen.

Seventeen years later, the tradition was reinstated when Melissa Edwards was crowned the 1989 Miss Bobcat.

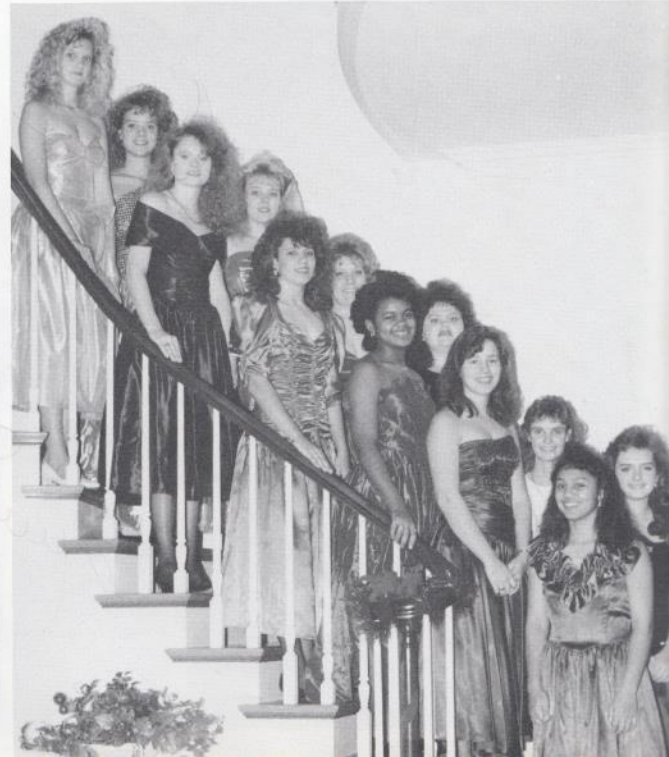
On this occasion, the four senior candidates were escorted by Hinton High School graduates who have since been inducted to the Football Hall of Fame.

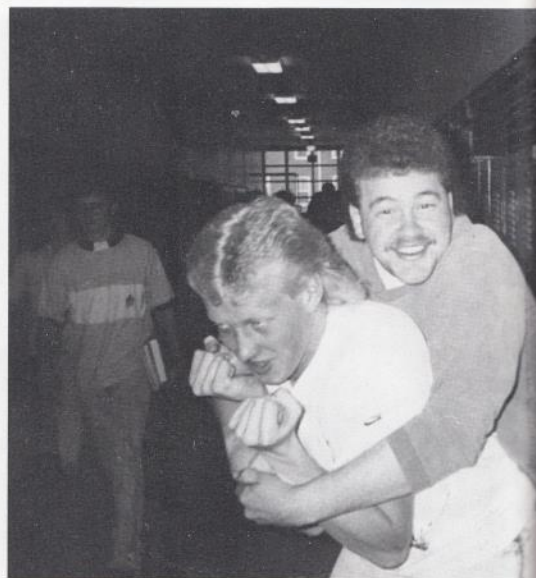

Making the difference

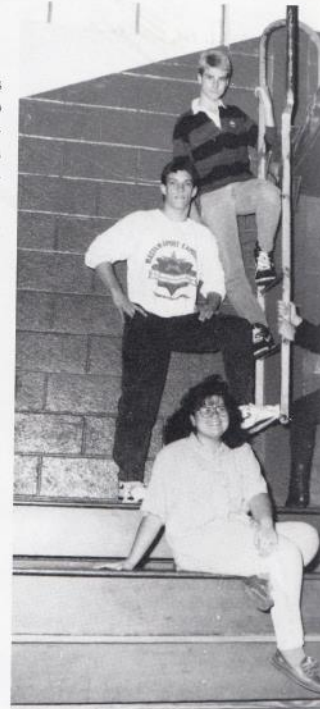

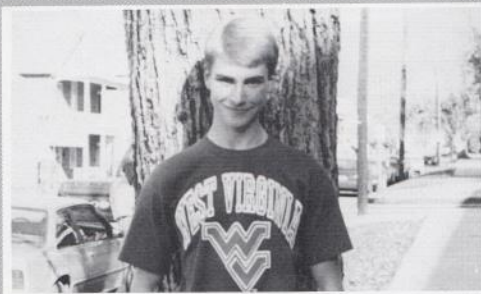

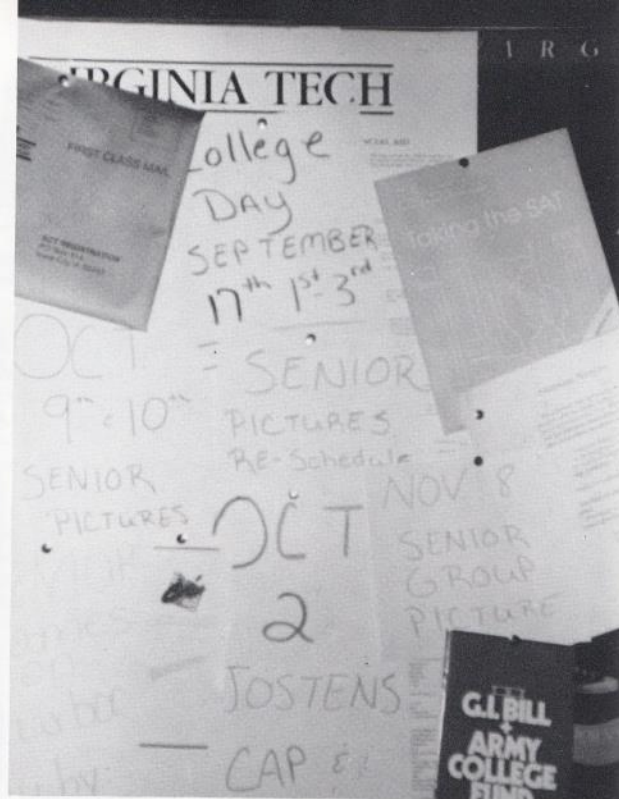

Previous to 1989-90, students were able to purchase their lunch at area businesses. This year, students were given a lunch card, similar to that of a credit card.

"I wrecked while driving down a gravel road in South Haven, Michigan. I could not regain control of my Bronco once it began to swerve sideways. It then hit a bank and flipped four times, and I was thrown 25 feet from the vehicle," says Earl.

The Bronco was beyond repair. Earl was paralyzed from the neck down, and his fourth vertebrae was crushed. After a lengthy time in a back brace, Earl is now able to walk, and he says he's glad to be alive.

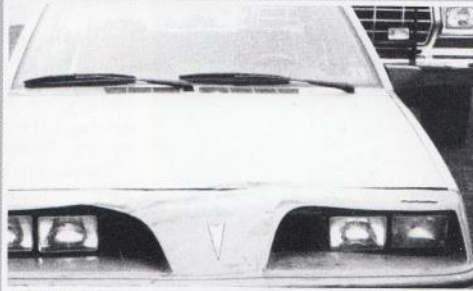


Robin Bolling is a junior at Hinton High School, and she has also had an accident, only Robin described hers as a "fender Bender".

Robin wrecked on October, Friday the 13th, 1989.

This was Robin's first and only wreck. "I was stopped at a stop sign in Bellepoint. I misjudged, and pulled out in front of a pick-up truck. I didn't get the ticket, though, and other than Renee Keatley's bump on the head, everyone was okay."

Robin didn't have her car fixed due to her liability insurance. She was, however, able to leave the scene unharmed.

This particular wreck was one of four that Pat has experienced, and definitely the worst.

Pat's car hydroplaned, skid sideways off the road, hit a rock pile, and headed for the river. Pat's car then uprooted four trees, went completely through a housecamp, and finally stopped, turned up-side down.

"I took a good, long look at the way I drive, and now, I always wear my seat-belt. This wreck was a really close call, one I still have nightmares about," said Pat.

Michelle wrecked on October 10, 1989. This was Michelle's first and only wreck, "knock on wood," she said.

Michelle was leaving home and coming down True Mountain, where she resides. True Road is a gravel and dirt, steep, and very narrow road.

Michelle was then run off the road by another unknown driver, when her car went over the wooded hill, and was stopped when it struck a tree.

"I had a bruised tailbone, and some bruised ribs. I was okay, thank God, but my Escort couldn't be repaired. It was totalled," said Michelle.

From The Classroom

Mr. O'Neal and Miss Boone are the Driver's Ed. teachers at H.H.S.

Mr. O'Neal feels that driver's ed. should be a required class. After all, only 10% of his students fail. "Lack of experience and different maturity levels are two major reasons for wrecks involving teens. They should listen to what I stress most: Driving is a privilege, not a right."

Students are allowed to take Driver's Ed. during the school year in which they turn 16.

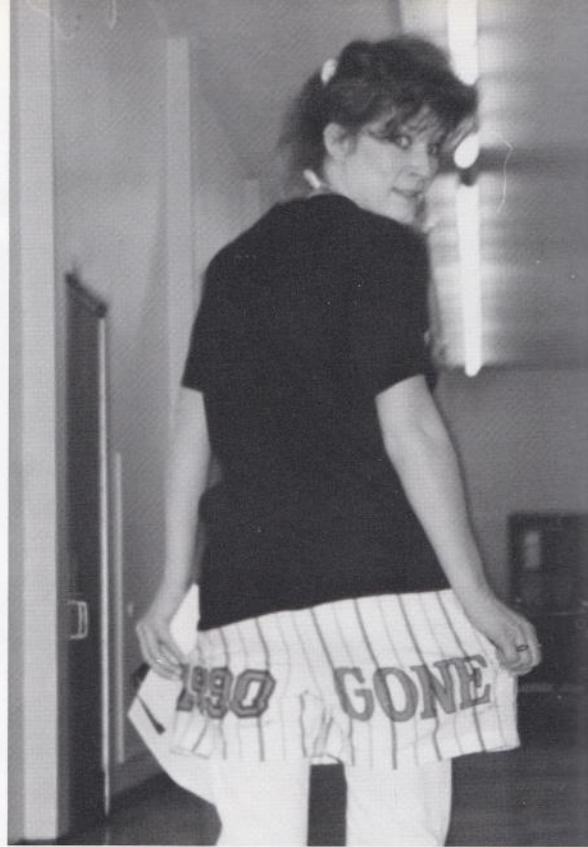

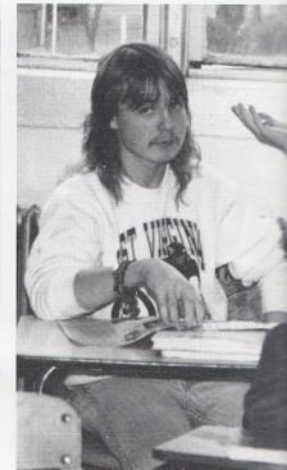

"Natural colors are in; neon is out," said Anna Biggs.

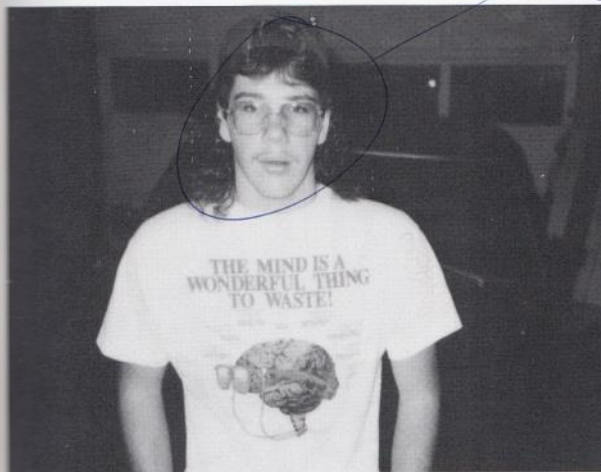

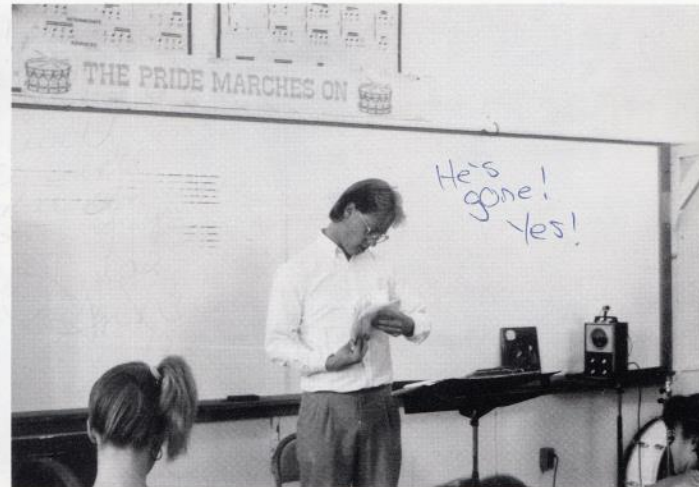


Paper work is what keeps Mrs. Crowder tied up and busy, but she finds time to smile, too.

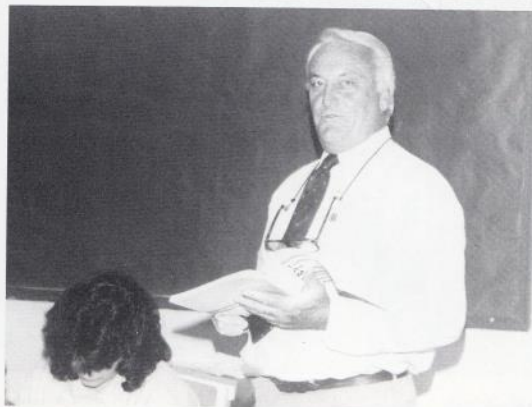

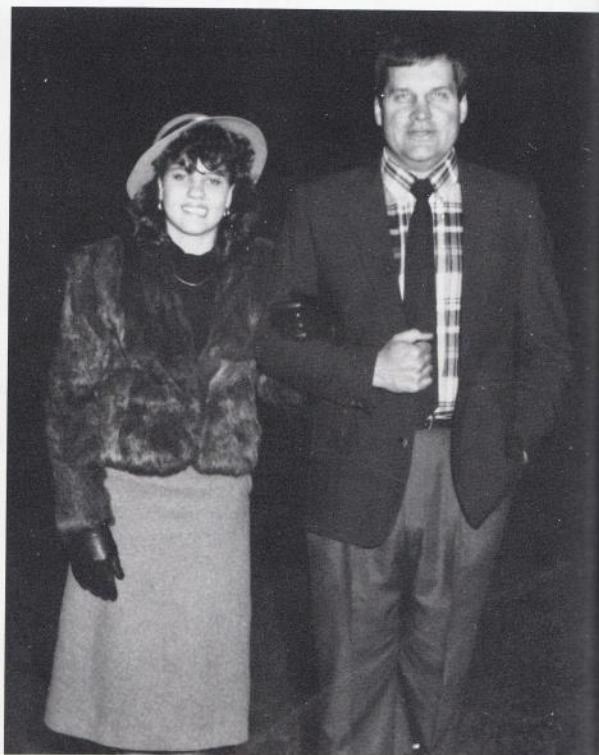

While Mr. Bandy experiences a change in the positions, students seem to agree with the change as well.

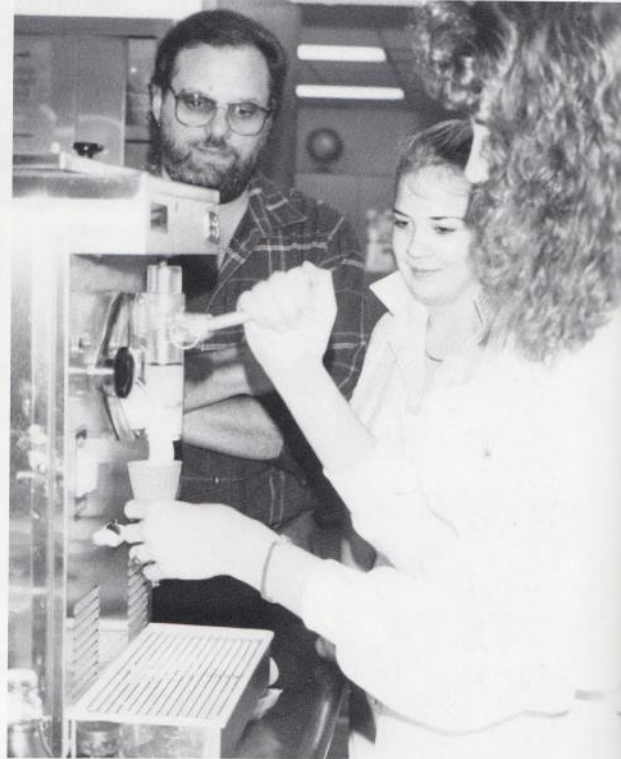

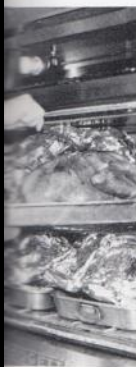

that I'll never forget. Mr. Keeney made sure that we had memories to last a lifetime and that we had fun as well as education," stated Christina McDaniel.

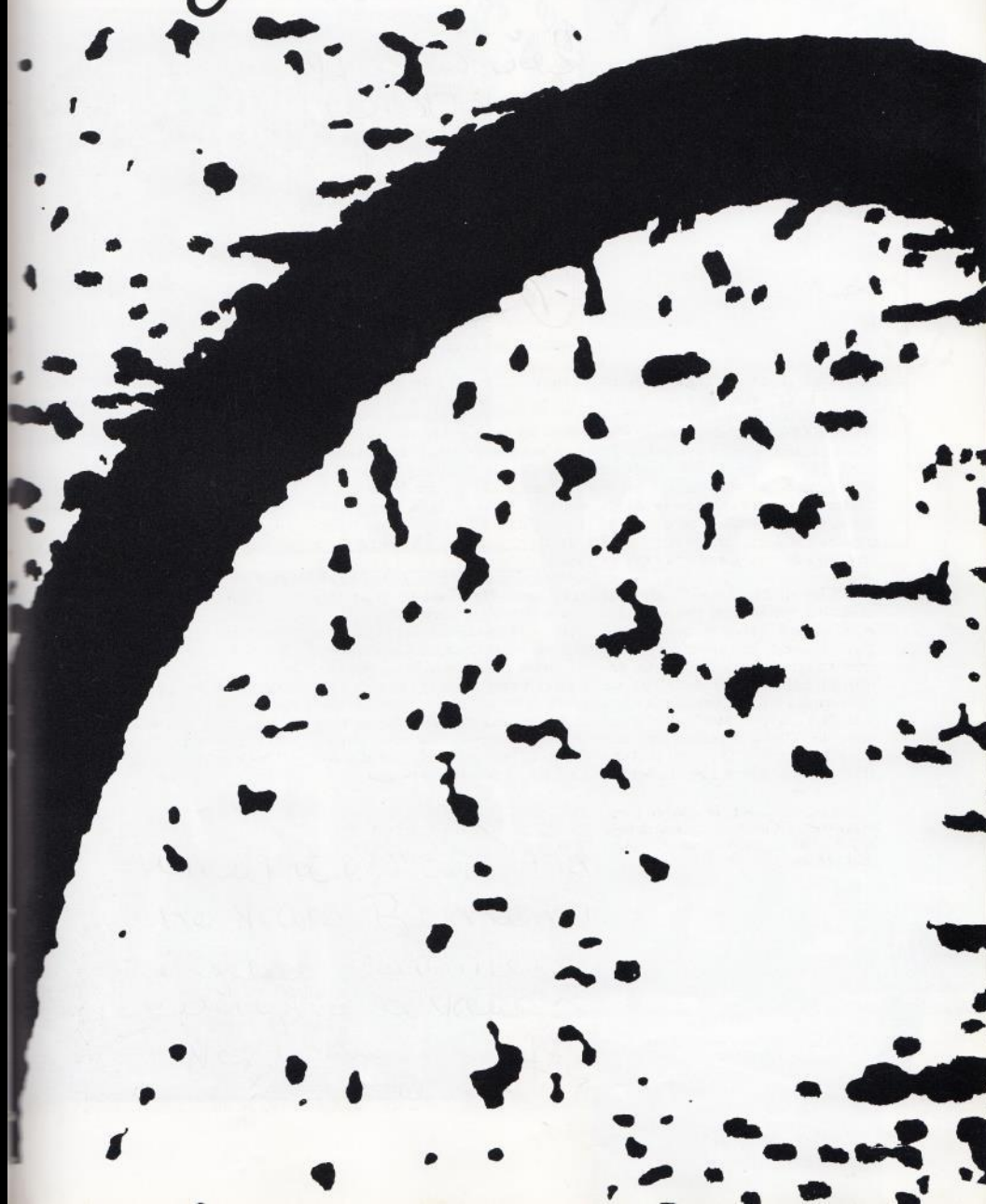

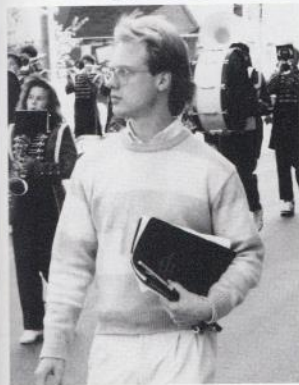

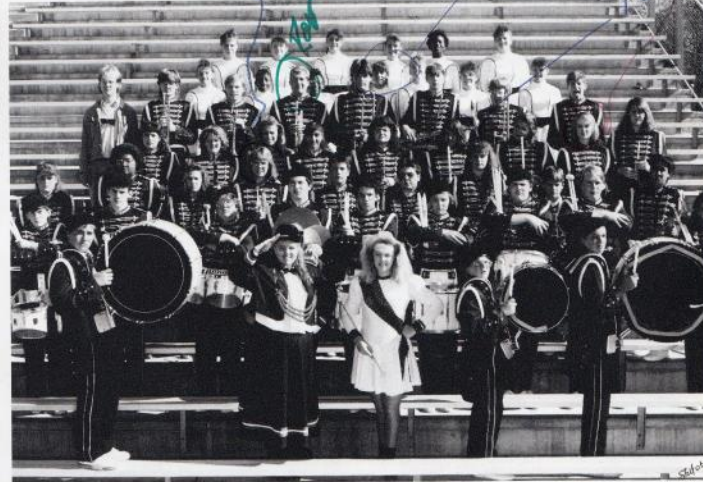
"I hope to bring consistency to the band and bring it into more of a group," he stated.

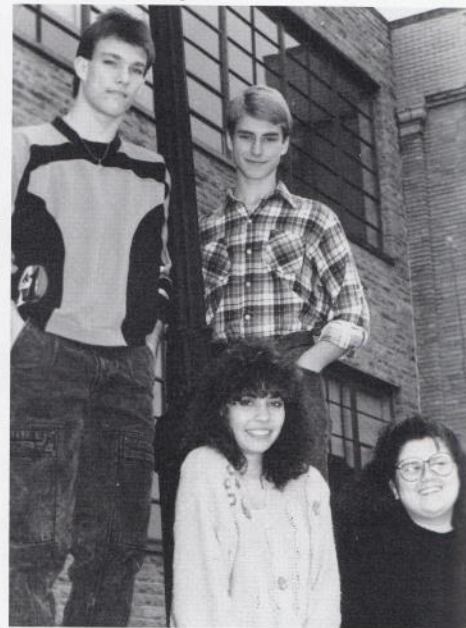

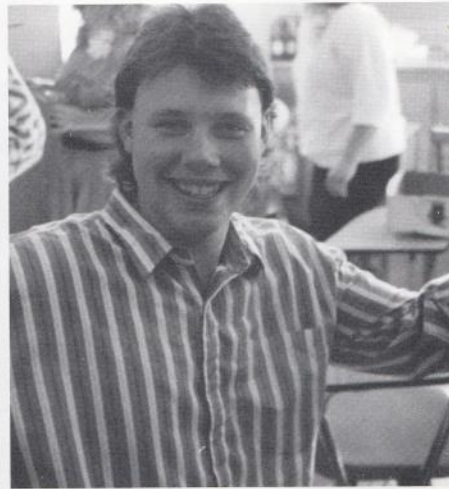

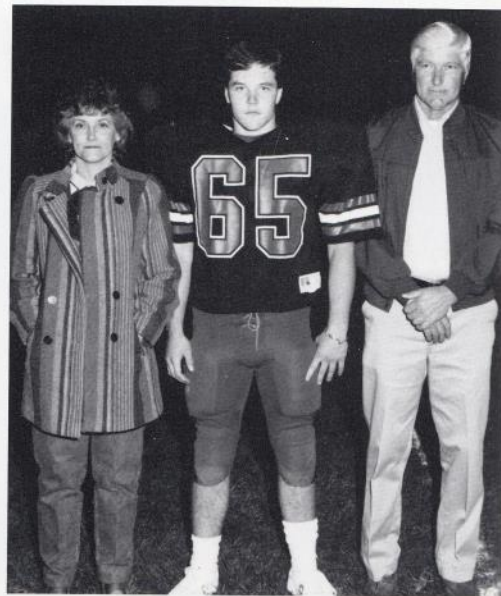

captured their 3rd consecutive Summers-Monroe Conference Championship, by defeating the Talcott Lady Pirates, for the 3rd year in a row.

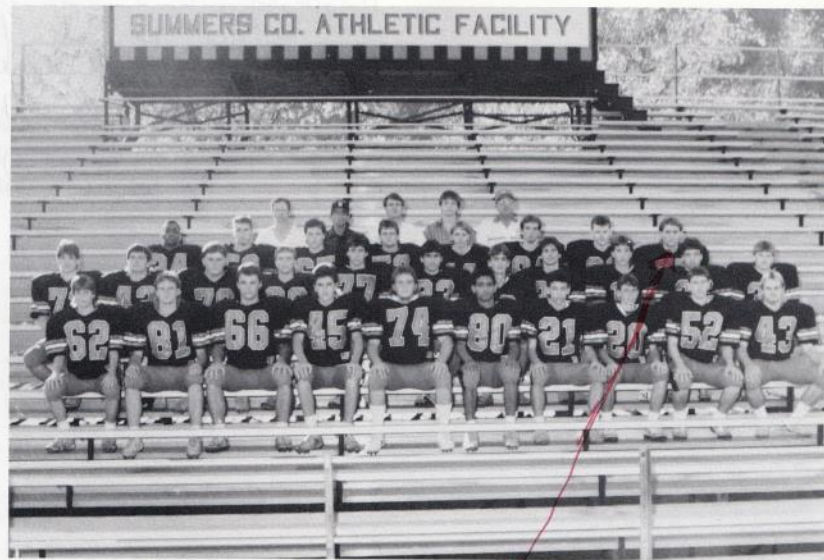

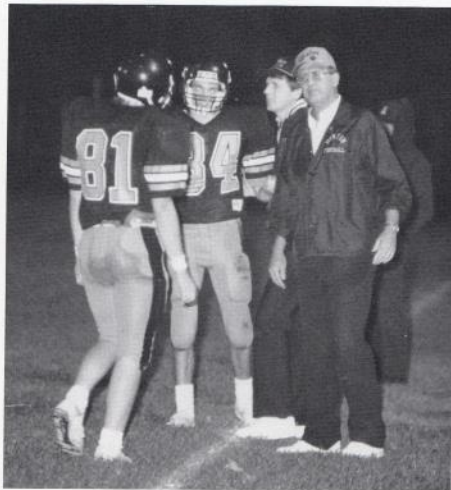

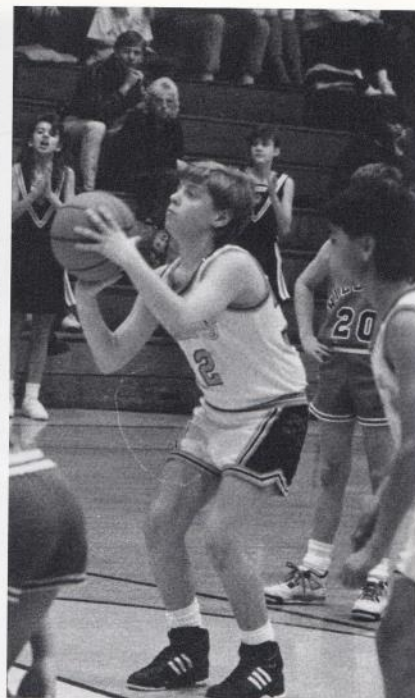
