

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
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
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'Gimme a B!'





Shawn Connor is one of the eighth grade students who participated in a group discussion concerning the separaCameron Earl Stracener is a member of the senior class, and like many others, he experienced a car wreck.

"I wrecked while driving down a gravel road in South Haven, Michigan. I could not regain control of my Bronco once it began to swerve sideways. It then hit a bank and flipped four times, and I was thrown 25 feet from the vehicle," says Earl.

The Bronco was beyond repair. Earl was paralyzed from the neck down, and his fourth vertebrae was crushed. After a lengthy time in a back brace, Earl is now able to walk, and he says he's glad to be alive.

Robin Bolling is a junior at Hinton High School, and she has also had an accident, only Robin described hers as a "fender Bender".

Robin wrecked on October, Friday the 13th, 1989.

This was Robin's first and only wreck. "I was stopped at a stop sign in Bellepoint. I misjudged, and pulled out in front of a pick-up truck. I didn't get the ticket, though, and other than Renee Keatley's bump on the head, everyone was okay."

Robin didn't have her car fixed due to her liability insurance. She was, however, able to leave the scene unharmed.

Pat Huffman wrecked his car on June 6, 1989, and says he was saved by his seat belt.

This particular wreck was one pf four that Pat has experienced, and definitely the worst.

Pat's car hydroplaned, skid sideways off the road, hit a rock pile, and headed for the river. Pat's car then uproated four trees, went completely through a housecamp, and finally stopped, turned up-side down.

"I took a good, long look at the way I drive, and now, I always wear my seatbelt. This wreck was a really close call, one I still have nightmares about," said Pat.

Michelle Connor is also a senior who wrecked her vehicle.


Michelle wrecked on October 10, 1989. This was Michelle's first and only wreck, "knock on wood," she said.

Michelle was leaving home and coming down True Mountain, where she resides. True Road is a gravel and dirt, steep, and very narrow road.

Michelle was then run off the road by another unknown driver, when her car went over the wooded hill, and was stopped when it struck a tree.

"I had a bruised tailbone, and some bruised ribs. I was okay, thank God, but my Escort couldn't be repaired. It was totalled," said Michelle.



During Computer Learning Month five computer science and analysis students from HHS traveled to South Charleston for the 21st science seminar held at Union Carbide's Technical Center.




















