

## History of the Senior Class

At the Homecoming Parade, high honors went to the freshmen for the best decorated float. We had decorated a car to look like a throne and had chosen, by popular vote, a Freshman Queen—Bette Osborne.

As the sophomore year rolled around we had begun to lose some of our greenness. The officers for this year were: President, Ernie Moore; Vice-President, Phylliss Gulley. This year, wishing to be like the upperclassmen, we decided to present to the student body a play, "Comin' Round the Mountain," a comedy sketch of rural life in the mountains. At the class intramurals, the prize for having the best decorated booth went to the sophomores. In the girls' intramurals, we easily won over the senior girls, 41-28.

For some unexplainable reason, by the time we were juniors there were just 116 of us. By this time we were beginning to look like the upperclassmen whom we had idolized. The president of this class was Bette Osborne; the vice-president, Betty Bryant; the secretary, Jeannie

Swiger; and the treasurer, Phyllis Gulley. The Junior-Senior Banquet and Prom, held in the Memorial Building on May 21, was a great success. The decoration committee worked hard and transformed the auditorium into a veritable wonderland of lavender and gold, our class colors. The theme for the banquet and dance was "Gold for the Forty-niners." The class flower was the violet and the motto was appropriately, "We, have the will, we'll make the way." It was at this time that we decided to revive the DART, which had not been published since 1942. On November 30, 1948, the school was introduced to a new band of thespians, the junior play cast. The play, "A Ready Made Family" by Jay Tobias, was a great success.

By 1949-1950 we had the will and we still were making our way. Tom Halloran was elected president of the class. Polly Sue Rogers was vice-president; Susan Ball, secretary; and Jo Ann Hodge, treasurer. The colors were red, the symbol of courage, and white, the symbol of purity. The flower was the red rose. The motto remained the same and we were proving ourselves more worthy of it every day. The last part of the senior year was crowded by activities. First the senior play, and Sneak Day, followed by Kid Day, and Senior Week, after which came the Citizenship Pageant, the Commencement Sermon, and on Thursday, the Commencement exercises and the Farewell Banquet and Dance.

Thus completes the four-year history of the Senior Class of 1950.




