

A prowling model of our school muscot, the bobcat, perches atop the newly constructed Hall of Fame Memorial at the Summers County Athletic Facility.


"United we stand






Double Take











Now the teachers and students are very happy; they have new windows and clean rooms. Both were jobs well done.













"I do not know who I am going to vote for for president, but I do plan on voting, " reiterates Melanie Humphrey.


Greg Carr states that his choice is Bill Clinton. "First of all I"m a democrat and at least he is open about his past experiences."



"My favorite way of cheating would have to be the use of the bubble gum stapper. All you have to do is write the asswers on the back of the sheet, and hide tunder your paper. Granted, it isn't always easy to do, but if you are in the right class, as pretty easy," comments Burt Lane.

Mike Harvey's favorite technique goes as follows: "I place two pieces of paper on top of each other, and write down the asswers on only one of them, but I make see I press down hard enough on the top copy to make impressions on the bottom.

Then I use the blank sheet with the impressions on it to use on the test. It has worked



every time."

"I don't see the point in making cheating difficult," adds Arthur Collier, "all I do is look over someone's shoulder and hope they are smart."

Eric Hartwell says,"My way is pretty standard. Most of the time I just write down most of the answers on a note card and hide them in the cuff of my shorts or pants."

These seniors did not give these quotes with the idea of other students using them, but with the idea of sharing part of their experiences at Hinton. In no way are they encouraging the students left here to use them at all. It is better to get an honest grade, because it will help you in the future.

Co-operative learning is a program in which students in a class are put into groups of about four or five and they work together in a fun and educational way.

























All in the family

Mr. John Kelly mainly concerns himself with the justion high students. He lends more emotional support than academic, but like Mr. Fitzsimmons, he is always there to listen.









Youth in Govt.

The 1992 Youth in Government Mock Legislative session took place on April 25-27 at the state Capitol building in Charleston. The participants from the Hinton Tri-Hi-Y were Courtney Davis, Kelly Lester, Jessica Reich, Jackie Jeffries, Alissa Pullen and Kelly Turner.

Prior to attending this event, these girls paired off and wrote a bill to be presented at the legislative session. The subjects of the bills were to amend laws already in effect in West Virginia. As in the state legislature, the bills had to be passed by a committee of around twenty delegates, then were brought to the House floor. If passed on the floor, the Youth Governor either signed the bill, or vetoed it.

Out of the three bills written by Hinton Highdelegates, two were signed by the Youth Governor. A bill to give fathers the right to paternity testing, presented by Kelly Lester and Courtney Davis, and a bill to prevent sexual discrimination in the workplace, presented by Jessica Reich and Jackie Jeffries, were both passed almost ununimously on the floor and signed. This was the first time in nine years that a bill presented by Hinton delegates has been passed.



Other proceeds from the sub sales also go toward the Billy Ray Honaker Scholarship.


















The boys varsity track team topped off the season with eight members in the state track and field competition at Laidley Field on May 29 and 30.




"I think we lost to Peterstown because the coaches and players didn't execute themselves like we are capable of." said Head Coach Ron Lilly.






