L. C. HALLORAN DIES THURSDAY;

Well-Known Hinton Man Succumbs After Illness Of Two Months

Lloyd Cresent Halloran, 43-yearold widely-known resident of Hinton, died in the Raleigh General hospital at Beckley at 5:15 o'clock Thursday afternoon, after an illness of two months duration.

He had been confined to the hospital for five weeks. His illness forced his resignation as financial secretary of Hopemont senitarium, a position to which he was appointed by Governor M. M. Neely in March, 1941.

Mr. Halloran was born in Hinton on April 25, 1899, the son of Mrs. Emma Humphreys Halloran and the late Dan Halloran, who died on July 16, of this year.

He received his education at Hinton high school and at an early age began employment with Wilson & Company, local branch. He was employed by Wilson & Company for over 15 years and served for a time as manager of the Hinton branch.

He spent some time in Wichita, Kansas, as manager of an automobile sales agency. Later, after returning to Hinton he was associated with his brother, Earl T. Halloran, in operating Halloran's Garage, for a number of years.

He also operated Halloran's Service Center, a filling station on Park avenue, after retiring from the automobile business.

He was a member of the Ascension Episcopal church.

Funeral services were held at the residence Saturday afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock with the Rev. Temple G. Wheeler, former rector of the Ascension Episcopal church here, officiating. Burial follow in the Greenbrier Burial Park.

Pallbearers for the service were Harry L. Miller, L. W. Baylor, H. G. Humphries, Alan Hill, John E. Faulconer, Robert Turner, Tom Kerby and Dewey Neely.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Mary Stuart Falconer Halloran; one son, Charles Halloran: two sisters, Mrs. R. G. Broaddus, and Mrs. L. A. Johnson, of this city; four brothers, P. B. Halloran, of Talcott; Earl T. Halloran, of Hinton; Dr. L. M. Halloran, of Beckley, and Dr. R. O. Halloran, of Charleston; and his mother, Mrs. Emma Halloran of Hinton.
