He was also a coach, someone who believed in the power of teamwork and the importance of supporting young people. From little league girls' basketball to high school girls' softball, Mecot poured his energy into helping our youth grow, learn, and succeed. His encouragement and leadership left a lasting impression on the athletes he mentored and the families he supported.

While attending Concord University, Mecot joined the Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity, where he continued his tradition of service by participating in philanthropic events. His commitment to helping others was unwavering, whether he was volunteering at college or right here in Hinton.

And who could forget his bright yellow Jeep, Rover? In the winter months, Mecot was a familiar sight, driving through town and pulling neighbors out of snowy ditches. He never hesitated to help, always ready with a smile and a helping hand.

Today, as we remember Sgt. Mecot Camara, let us honor his legacy by continuing the work he started. His life reminds us that giving back and never giving up are values that make Hinton strong.
