Hinton Semi-Pro Football Team - 1947–1949

The following slides provide information about a Hinton Semi-Pro Football Team which played in the late 1940s. Aside from a couple dozen or so newspaper clippings, there is very limited information about this team or its players. We know that the first game was in 1947 and the team name was the “Chessies”, then the “Hellcats”. They played in 1948 and 1949 as the “Wildcats”.

Some newspaper clippings have been re-written for improved legibility .

Semi-Pro Game At Hinton Today

HINTON—A group of former Hinton Bobcat footballers, some of them veterans of college grid-irons will take over Avis Field this afternoon at 2:30 to meet a similar outfit from Montgomery in a semi-pro game that has brought out a lot of interest locally.

The "Hellcats" are led by Billy Jo Lilly, one time Bobcat quarterback, and number on their squad such former stars as big Poody Phillips who played at Wake Forest, Dick Burdette of Concord, Rob Vass of W. Va. Tech and Arnette Lilly of the West Virginia Mountaineers.

The probable lineups: Hinton—Fredeking and Rob Vass, ends; Ralph Vass and Meadows, tackles; Wheeler and Phipps, guards; Stone, center; Terry, quarterback; Phillips, fullback; Willie and Meadows, halfbacks.

Montgomery — Demark and Waugh, ends; Zickafoose and Montgomery, tackles; Lockman White, guards; Kellman, center; Vargo, quarterback; Machino, fullback; Stevens and Form, halfbacks.

HELLCATS BOW TO HORNETS, SEMIPRO TEAM

HINTON, Nov. 2 — The Hellcats opened the semipro football season here rather belatedly today and took a 13 to 6 beating by the Montgomery Hornets, who had a decided weight advantage along with the experience of having played a few games to date. The local team just secured its uniforms yesterday and had no chance to get into any real hard workouts.

But in the opening quarter Hinton gave the visitors plenty of worry, but after scoring tied from that point. Zickafoose blocked a punt in the second, scooped it up on the 14 and went for the TD that tied the score.

In the third quarter Moschino's long pass to Farmer produced the winning touchdown. Moschino passing to Chaffen for the extra point. A large crowd attended the game, played at Avis Park. The lineup:

Hellcats Lose To Montgomery

HINTON, Nov. 2 — The breaks of the game, going against the Hinton Hellcats, Summers County's first semi-professional football team, cost them at least a tied score, of 6-all, in Summers county's first semi-professional game here at Avis Park Sunday afternoon, when a blocked kick, bouncing far back towards their goal line, was picked up by Zickafoose, of the Montgomery Hornets, and carried over for a touchdown late in the third quarter.

Hinton went out in front in the first quarter when "Big Phillips, of Hinton high school Bobcat fame, crashed over the line for the first score of the game. The extra point, good on a run-over play, was nullified by backfield-in-motion penalty, and the Hellcats remained in control of the situation until the third quarter. The final score was Montgomery 13, Hinton 6.

In the third stanza, Corilla, of the Hornets, who was really a hornet ti the Hellcats, broke through for a nice run, and the Hornets were able to tie the score, missing the extra point. Many spectators expected to see the touchdown run called back on a backfield in motion penalty, but the officials saw it otherwise, and the tiring Hellcats, some of whom were in uniform for the first time in even years, were unable to control the breaks of the game from there out.

The large crowd, comparing favorably with some Bobcat turnouts, was well pleased with the showing made by the Hellcats, and gave them good support.

Officials of the game were Porterfield, Beasley and Allen.

Semi Pros To Play

It looks as if the Hinton semi-pros are going to give football another fling here this season, and such action is certain to meet the approval of local fans.

Hinton was too far away to be accepted in the recently organized West Virginia-Ohio league, but it is probable that the local team can work out some games with teams in the league.

Montgomery will have a team again this year, so that means two games for sure, and an effort will be made to have teams organized in Beckley, Oak Hill and Princeton.

All the games played last year were interesting, and local fans have been looking forward to seeing the games this year, therefore there was much disappointment when it was thought that Hinton would not be able to have a team. There is little doubt but that the locals can turn out a fine team if all the available material shows up. The backfield could be a "dream" with such boys as Charlie Schrader, late of West Virginia, Maynard Bruce, who played with V.P.I. last year, "Flop" Osborne, as sweet a running back as anyone would want to see, "Big Poodie" Phillips, a hard driving fullback, and one of the best ever developed here, "Rit" Burdette, "Morty" Meadows, "Little Poodie" Phillips and several others.

With a group like the above dividing the playing time, the sport would not be quite so hard on the various individuals as it was last year.

There is also quite a bit of line material available, and the Hinton team could field a forward wall that would average well over the 200-pound mark.

The local team will also have more time to get in condition than they did last year, so we see no reason why the local semi-pros won't attract capacity crowds this year if they get the games.

GOOD SPIRIT

Another good thing about this semi-pro sport as played last year was the sportsmanship shown by all the teams. The boys played hard all the time, but there was never any unnecessary roughness or unsportsmanship conduct on the part of the players.

Everyone seemed to have the proper spirit, and as a result there were no serious injuries of any kind.

Beckley football fans, always rabid followers of the pigskin sport, may get a looksee at the semi-pro division of the game - if a drive to establish a team here, currently underway, pans out.

The first breath of this possibility came to life yesterday when two former Hinton High athletes dropped in on this department to see how the land lays.

YOU MAY RECALL that Hinton first entered the semi-pro field last year, competing in a makeshift league that consisted of Montgomery, East Bank, South Charleston and Hinton.

East Bank and South Charleston recently became charter members of the newly organized Bi-State League (first games in which are scheduled Friday night) leaving Hinton and Montgomery on the outside looking in temporarily.

The Bi-State League by the way bids fair to become quite a circuit. It consists of, in addition to East Bank and South Charleston, Logan and three Ohio teams, Portsmouth, Ironton and Jackson. The teams have hired capable coaches and plan to make a big time business of it.

LOGAN HAS Rink Hefner, former Morris Harvey star, as mentor; Ironton is tutored by Bob Kales and Glen Presnell, the later a former star at the University of Nebraska; Jackson has Walter Henson, former Marshall back; East Bank has Roy Williams, member of the East Bank High staff; and Portsmouth is tutored by Ray Kornhoff.

The two Hinton envoys, Ray Phipps and Bob Vass, both members of the 1939-49-41 Bobcat teams, hope to get a league of from six to eight teams operating in the southern end of West Virginia, and are thinking in terms of arranging a playoff between Bi-State champion and the winner of their own loop.

They already have two teams, Hinton and Montgomery, ready and rearing to go. They hope to add such teams as Beckley, Princeton, Bluefield, Oak Hill, Mount Hope, maybe Whitesville, and perhaps some others. The Hinton team has scheduled its first workout this week.

IT CAN BE A GOOD venture for some interested party or parties. Here is the picture of how Hinton did in its first chance. Five games were played (on a 50-50 basis of dividing the gate) and in those five games the Hinton team cleared enough (at \$1.00 admission prices) to end the season about \$200 in the red. This was after \$1,500 worth of equipment was paid for, which is not bad for the first season.

Hinton had only two home games, one a spur of the moment affair that drew about 500 cash customers and the other against Montgomery, pulling out a fan turnout of about 800.

The team played on the high school field, which, thanks to the generosity of the Summers County Board of Education, cost the team, only the price of the lights.

IT IS POSSIBLE that some arrangement, at not too prohibitive a cost, could be reached for Woodrow Wilson High School for use of their field at times when it is not in use for scholastic games

The two Hinton representatives tried to contact a couple of men suggested as possible promoters of the game here but had made not report of their progress at the time this article was written.

They asked, however, that anyone wishing more details contact them through this corner as soon as possible. It could become a good thing.

Meanwhile all such prospective backers, and all interested players are requested to call or write this department, so we can get a glimmer of how much interest can be aroused.

IF ENOUGH INTEREST is shown, a meeting of interested parties will be called to see what constructive steps can be taken. Let me know how you feel about it immediately. If any steps are taken they will have to be made soon since all details of preliminary practice, the selection of a coaching staff, and what-not must be ironed out. It is hoped a meeting can be held Thursday or Friday.

Meanwhile, Hinton has lined up quite a team. Just to name a few, they have Poody Phillips, star Hinton back about 1939 and later a squad member at Wake Forest; Maynard Bruce, back, Hinton '42 and VPI; Scott Meadows, end, Hinton, '41; Vass, end, Hinton and W.Va. Tech, '46; Phipps, tackle, Hinton; Jimmy Meadows, tackle, '42 Melvin Wheeler, guard, Hinton, '43; Melvin Richmond, guard Gauley Bridge; Fred Vass, end, Hinton '46; Jimmy Hartley, center, Hinton '47 and North-South game star August 20; Malcolm Osborne, back, Hinton '47; and Jim Porterfield, Talcott High Coach and former Glenville star.

In addition Charley "Chug" Schrader, new Hinton coach and star at WVU last year, will both play and help Coach Billy Joe Lilly, Hinton quarterback '36 with the instructing.

As I mentioned above, such an enterprise here can become a big thing and now's the time to get our feet wet. If Beckley doesn't grab the chance offered, we'll all be outside looking in – because whether Beckley enters or not a league like this certain to spring up and become a going thing in southern West Virginia. Let's hear from you.

Bruce for the last two days has acted as the guy up front who leads the squad in all those intricate conditioning exercises. I watched him put Hinton's newly organized semi-pro squad through their paces yesterday, and it made me grunt just to watch.

About 20 former college and high school stars reported at the field Wednesday afternoon at 5 o'clock, and some of those boys would be the answer to any coach's prayer, either in college or high school.

There is little doubt but the local team will be plenty good if they keep up their interest. About 10 or more other prospects are expected out today and tomorrow, and it is planned to keep a squad of 30 out all the time.

If there are any other players in this area who would like to play, they should report to Coach Lilly any afternoon at 5 o'clock.

Local fans are looking forward to the semi-pro games this season for they remember the fine brand of ball played last year. With the team better organized, and more time to get in shape, the brand of ball this year should be much better than last.

Meeting Tonight**

Tonight in Beckley another effort will be made to organize a semi-pro football league for this section, and at this time, it looks as if at least five teams are ready to go.

Hinton, Montgomery, Beckley, Oak Hill and possibly Smithers, seem certain of fielding teams. It is hoped that Bluefield, Princeton or Mount Hope will enter a team to assure the loop of at least six entries.

All reports from the Bi-State League, that includes three teams from West Virginia and three from Ohio, indicate that the games are being attended by large crowds.

The Hinton squad has already been working out, and there is little doubt but that this city will field a powerful eleven. Beckley already has 18 players signed up, including many former Beckley high school and college stars. It is hoped here that the group will take some definite action toward the formation of a league tonight.

Flash:

Since today's column was written, I have learned that Hinton's Wildcats, the local independent team, will definitely open its season here Sunday afternoon against Mount Hope.

This will be an official league game, and the starting time is tentatively scheduled at 3:15pm.

The local boys have been working out for the last month, and apparently are in good condition as a result of regular scrimmages.

Just what Mount Hope will have to offer is not known. The Fayette countians however, have been practicing regularly too, and will bring a 25-man squad of former high school and college players here for the game.

Hinton's chances for victory Friday may suffer somewhat if the veteran Kyle Gwinn is unable to play. The hefty co-captain is bothered with a bad knee, and for this reason had to be removed from the East Bank game. The injury has not responded to treatment, and is badly swollen. Gwinn was in uniform Tuesday, but did not participate, in any of the rough work. He confined his activities to running only to keep in condition.

Gwinn is scheduled to visit the hospital today for an x-ray, and this picture should tell the story.

There is a possibility that the new semi-pro football league of which Hinton is a member, may make its debut here Sunday afternoon.

The local team was scheduled with Oak Hill but the Fayette countians will be unable to appear, as their uniforms have not yet arrived.

There is a possibility that the Mount Hope team may play here in place of Oak Hill. Beckley is slated to play Montgomery.

Since there are only five teams in the loop, Oak Hill will be given a bye in place of Mount Hope in case the latter decides to appear here.

Hinton is ready to go, in fact the local squad of some 25 players have been working out daily at the Avis park after the high school finishes practice.

New League To Open Schedule On October 3rd
Chessies Open Slate At Oak Hill

The Hinton Chessies entered a five-team football league formed last night in Beckley at a meeting of team officials from Montgomery, Oak Hill, Hinton, and Beckley. Opening dates were set and a schedule approved and the loop named the Southern West Virginia Football Conference.

The Constitution and by-laws of the league will be the same as the Bi-State conference and the league officials will contact Bi-State commissioner Fred Burns and plan a playoff between the two leagues.

The league will open with Beckley meeting Montgomery and the Chessies playing at Oak Hill on Sunday, October 3. The complete schedule was formulated at the meeting but the dates have to be ironed out. In the event a sixth team should enter before the October 10 deadline, they will meet Mount Hope who drew a bye for the first game.

Election of officers and the official adoption of the constitution and by-laws was set for another meeting in Beckley next week.

The Oak Hill team was not represented at the meeting last night because the Fayette County team was meeting at the same time to pass approval on joining the league. They were represented by proxy at the session.

Other officials present at the meeting included Ed Kellem of Montgomery, Jim Rowe and "Bud Jennings of Mount Hope, Erie Howery of Beckley, and Ray Phipps and Bill Stone of the Chessies.

Bad Precedent

The action of the Board of Education of Raleigh county in denying use of the high school field to the recently organized Beckley Rockets, semi-pro footballers, should be soundly condemned by every fair-minded citizen of Raleigh county.

Just how the use of the field by the semi-pros would interfere in any way with the high school program is difficult to understand.

If the Rockets would interfere with the high school program, or hurt the field in any way, then they should be denied its use.

Instead of trying to hinder the new football program that has taken life in this section, the Raleigh board should try to help it along. It is nothing more than an amateur organization, and the boys who will play are probably all taxpayers and voters, and they should be permitted to use the field.

Charleston, Logan, South Charleston, Hinton and all the rest of the cities are permitting use of their fields by the Independents, and the action of the Raleigh Board is certainly not in keeping with Beckley's state-wide reputation of being a progressive city made up of real go-getting citizens.

Here is hoping that the members of the Raleigh board will reconsider their action and let the boys use Woodrow Wilson high school field when it is not in use by the high school.

Hinton's Wildcats (that's the name of the independent football team here) are confronted with the problem of playing two games in as many days.

The locals were originally scheduled to play the Oak Hill team at Oak Hill on Saturday night, but the Oak Hill uniforms had not arrived, and it was thought the game was off.

Thinking that Oak Hill was not ready to start, Hinton scheduled a game with Mount Hope here Sunday, only to learn that Oak Hill's uniforms had arrived, and the O.H. team wanted to play as originally scheduled.

Now the local boys don't know whether to play just one game or both. It is a problem that the boys themselves will have to settle.

Ex-High School Stars Set For Exhibition Tilt
Bruce, Phillips To Lead Wildcats Against Stallions

Hinton fans may have the opportunity of seeing some high class football here Sunday afternoon at 3:15pm as the Hinton Wildcats oppose Mount Hope in an exhibition game at C&O park.

The local outfit was originally scheduled to play Oak Hill there tomorrow night in a regularly scheduled league game. The Oak Hill team was not ready, however, and the exhibition here was scheduled.

Some of the greatest Hinton stars in history will don the moleskins again for the fray, and after a months' intensive practice, they feel that they are ready to go.

Maynard Bruce, husky Hinton fullback under Mickey McClung, and for two years the regular varsity quarterback at V.P.I. is expected to lead the Hinton attack with able assistance from "Big Poodie" Phillips, former star fullback here, and "Flop" Osborne, a sweet-running back. Boyd Vansickle and Raymond Parry are other boys on whom the local coach, Billy Joe Lilly, is planning his hopes for victory.

A big forward wall will swing into action for the locals with Bill Stone, Jimmy Hartley, Fred Vass, "Tobe" Humphries, Tommy Clinebell, Melvin Richmond, Denny Surber, Julian Fredeking, Harry Gore, "Lefty" Curtis, Bobby Jack Crush, Jack Sweeney, "Applejack" Wheeler, Fred Vass, "Muskrat" Ratliff, Jimmy Thompson, Ray Phipps, Charles Johnson, and "Bud" Maddy, all well known local athletes who are expected to see action.

From the above list, Coach Lilly can pick a fast as well as a heavy team for the fracas, but according to word from Mount Hope, the same situation exists there.

Fred Burgess, former Concord star and now coach at Kingston will be at halfback with Fred Spadaro at 170 at the other half. U.J. Baird, the Mount Hope quarter, is the smallest man on the team at 140 pounds.

Some huskies will perform in the Mount Hope line with Rowe and Taylor at the tackles, weighing 220 and 230 pounds respectively. Jackson, a guard, tips the beams at 250, while Bill Criss, a former all-state guard, weighs 190 pounds. Stone and Christian, the ends, will weigh around 150 pounds but both men are exceptionally fast.

The Mount Hope team is being coached by Bud Jennings, former high school coach there, who is now handling the junior high team.

Last year the local team played several fast games here giving the fans a nice afternoon's entertainment, therefore it is hoped that a large crowd will attend the game Sunday afternoon to give the Hinton boys a good start financially.

After the game tomorrow, the local team will swing into their regular schedule of 10 games that will see home and home games with each of the other league teams that include Oak Hill, Mount Hope, Beckley, Montgomery and Rainelle.

Faulconer Named Grid Commissioner

John Faulconer, publisher of the Hinton Daily News, was elected commissioner of the new Southern West Virginia Football Conference, a semi-pro grid league in southern West Virginia.

Bill Barrett, Beckley radio sportscaster and grid official, was at the same time, elected secretary-treasurer of the new loop.

Voting for the offices was conducted by mail with representatives of each of the six teams entered in the league, sending their ballots to George Springer, Beckley sports editor who was acting as chairman.

The new league will officially open when the Beckley Rockets meet the Montgomery Greyhounds in Montgomery, Wednesday night.

Sunday afternoon the Beckley Rockets will journey to the local field to meet the Hinton Wildcats, with the Montgomery Greyhounds clashing with the Mount Hope Stallions on the Fayette county field. Rainelle and Oak Hill will round out the schedule with a game on the Rainelle field.

Hinton Defeats Stallions

Osborne And Bruce Score For Wildcats

Hinton Looked Good In Exhibition Tilt

Coach Billy Joe Lilly's Hinton Wildcats of the Southern West Virginia Football Conference, defeated the Mount Hope Stallions 1400 in an exhibition game at Avis field yesterday afternoon.

Maynard Bruce and "Flop" Osborne scored the two Wildcat scores, while Bruce added the extra points from placement.

The first Wildcat score climaxed a drive that started on the Mount Hope 47 where Bruce cut wide around his own right end to move the ball to the Mount Hope 13. Bobby Jack Crush moved the ball to the five yard stripe on a left end sweep. Big Poodie Phillips hit the center of the line, but was held for no gain. On the next play, Maynard Bruce cut wide around his right end to score standing up. Bruce also added the extra point from placement.

Both teams played on even terms in the second period with the Wildcats in scoring position only once when Bruce passed to Osborne for a first down on the Mount Hope 15. The Stallions line held for three downs and Bruce's pass to Rob Vass was incomplete.

The second half opened with Bruce taking the Mount Hope kickoff behind his own goal line and running through the entire Stallions team with the exception of the safety man. Rob Vass threw a body block into the safety man and Bruce tripped over Vass to the Hinton 38. The lone Mount Hope score came early in the third period when a pass gave them a first down on the local's 25 yard line. On the next play Eddie Stone passed to his brother, Tod Stone standing on the Hinton five yard stripe, who ran the remaining distance to score. Tod Stone added the extra point from placement.

The final score of the game came in the last minutes of the third period when the Wildcats registered a first down on the Mount Hope 34. Osborne picked up one yard at center. Bruce faded back on the next play to heave a long pass into the waiting arms of "Flop" Osborne on the five yard stripe who ran over for the score. Again, Bruce added the point from placement.

Both teams battled to a standstill in the final period with neither team getting in scoring position. The game ended with the Wildcats in possession of the ball on their own 30 yard stripe.

Wildcats Take Conference Opener

Maynard Bruce Paces Hinton Semi-Pros As Rockets Fall Under Aerial Attack

Despite a weight advantage that was obvious even from the stands, the Beckley Rockets did little more than sputter here yesterday as the Hinton Wildcats, paced by Assistant Coach Maynard Bruce, took a 26-6 victory in their Southern West Virginia Conference opener.

The Wildcats scored two lightning-like touchdowns before all of the 1,200 spectators had settled in their seats. With the game two minutes old, rangy Rob Vass blocked a Rocket punt and Hinton recovered on the enemy 24. Bruce and Pookie Phillips drove to the 19 where "Flop" Osborne took a lateral from Bruce and sprinted left for a score. Three minutes later, on the second play after the ensuing Wildcats kickoff. Bruce pulled in a Beckley pass thrown by Phil Milano and raced untouched for 45 yards and pay-dirt.

Two passes from Bruce to little Bobby Crush carried to the Beckley two-yard strip early in the second quarter and from there the ex-Bobcat went over on the third try.

With Hinton enjoying a 19-0 lead, the Rockets came to life in the same period, and taking advantage of a short Wildcat punt, drove to the Wildcat 11 yard line on passes from Ed Wolfe to Meadows. From there, Dick Shuck passed to Milano, who skipped over for the one Rocket tally.

After a third period which saw the air filled with passes but no score, the Wildcats tallied again in the final stanza. Four consecutive passes from Bruce to Vass, Bud Maddy, and Crush, coupled with a penalty against the Rockets, gave Hinton possession on the Beckley one-yard line. Bruce passed again to Phillips in the corner of the end zone for the final Hinton marker.

Late in the game, the Rockets threatened when Bruce was trapped on fourth down on the Hinton 26, but a pass interception and a thrilling 62 yard dash by Boyd Vansickle brought the Cats out of the hole and found them knocking on the Beckley door as the game ended. A play-by-play account follows:

FIRST QUARTER

Milano brought Phipps' kickoff to the Beckley 30. Two line plays gained one yard and Shuck's pass was incomplete. Rob Vass leaped high in the air to block Meadows's punt and Hinton recovered the ball on the Beckley 24. Bruce sneaked through center for 5. Phillips failed to gain through the middle. Osborne took a lateral from Bruce and raced around left end for 19 yards and a touchdown. Bruce's kick for the point was wide.

Beckley took Phipps' kickoff on the Rocket's 22. A line play failed to gain and Milano's pass was intercepted by Bruce, who raced untouched from the Beckley 45 for a touchdown. Phillips' kick was low.

Martino took Phipps' short kickoff on the Beckley 46. After a line play failed to gain, Vass tossed Wolf back to the 35. Lubich got hammered behind the line of gain, and after an incomplete pass, Beckley was forced to punt.

Fielding a short punt, the Wildcats were set up for a first down on the Hinton 49. Crush caught Bruce's pass on the Beckley 46 and was stopped in his tracks. Bruce passed to Maddy for a first down on the Beckley 26. Crush gathered in Bruce's running pass and reached the Beckley 14 and the quarter ended. Hinton 19, Beckley 0.

SECOND QUARTER

Phillips lost a yard at left end. Bruce missed Crush with a short running pass. Bruce passed to Crush on the Beckley 9. Bruce passed again to Crush who was stopped after one yard at center, and then was stopped for no gain at the same spot. On fourth down, Crush rammed through left tackle to score. Bruce's kick was good.

Bobby Richmond took the Hinton kickoff on the Beckley 37, where he was dropped by Clinebell. Wolfe recovered Meadows' fumble on the 32. Johnson knocked down Lubich's pass intended for Crookshanks. Lubich passed over the head of Crookshanks, who was in the open.

Curtis took Meadow's punt on the Hinton 25, where Crookshanks threw him to the ground. Johnson got 5 at right end. Gore failed to gain. Curtis lost to the Hinton 35 on an attempted left end sweep.

Johnson took the Beckley kickoff on the Hinton 10 and returned to the 29. Johnson failed to gain at center. Phillips lost 5 at right end as the half closed. Hinton 19, Beckley 6.

THIRD QUARTER

Phillips brought Salango's kickoff to the Hinton 29. Bruce got 3 at right tackle. Bruce passed to Crush on the Hinton 16, but a backs-in-motion penalty set the Wildcats back on their own 24.

Shuck intercepted Bruce's long pass intended for Vass on the 50 and lugged it to the Hinton 40. Shuck sneaked for 5 yards. Richmond and Phipps tossed Meadows for a one yard loss. The Hinton line drove Lubich back to the Hinton 47 when he could find no receiver.

Bruce took Meadows' kick on the Hinton 15 and returned to the 21. The Beckley line charging hard, held Bruce to no gain at center. Milano intercepted Crush's pass on the Hinton 26 and was downed immediately. Lubich failed to gain. Vass blocked Shuck's attempted pass to Shuck, who was in the open. Shuck muffed Lubich's pass in the flat. Parry knocked down Lubich's pass intended for Crookshanks behind the goal, and the Wildcats took over on their own 26. Shuck's pass went wild. Meadows gathered in Shuck's pass at midfield and was downed at the Hinton 48. Lubich drove for a first down on the Hinton 38. On a end-around play, Turner got three. Richmond stopped Malano after a one yard gain. Shuck passed to Crookshanks for a first down on the Hinton 24. Meadows failed to gain. Wolfe's pass sailed over Bobby Richmond's head in the end zone. A sizeable crowd braved chilly winds to see the unbeaten Wildcats run their win streak to three straight in Southern West Virginia Conference play. The loss was the second in three games for Rainelle.

The first Wildcat touchdown was a mass achievement, though Maynard Bruce got official credit. On the second play after Charlie Schrader's kickoff was downed on the visitor's ten yard line, Joe Witt's lateral pass went haywire and bounced over the Rainelle goal where it was pounced upon by a horde of Hinton players. Locals May Card Other Game With Conference Team

A playoff game between the champions of the Southern West Virginia Semi-Pro Hinton Wildcats and South Charleston, titleholder of the Bi-State League, is definitely out.

The Wildcats decided that at a meeting during their practice session yesterday afternoon.

They left the way open, however, for at least one more game, possibly a return tussle, Sunday, with Oak Hill, Rainelle, or Montgomery.

Co-Coach Billy Joe Lilly explained that with three first-string men unavailable, Paul Phillips, Charley Schrader, and Bobby Crush, a playoff with South Charleston was out of the question.

Phillips has dropped from the squad with a shoulder injury. Crush is ill with the flu, and Schrader feels he cannot take the chance of reinjuring his bad ankle on the eve of Hinton high's all-important Thanksgiving Day game with Beckley. The absence of these three men, Lilly pointed out, would leave a squad of only fifteen, too few for the bruising brand of football played by the semi-pro leagues. "The absolute minimum is twenty men in this type of football."

Oak Hill, after its 14-7 defeat here last Sunday, asked for a return game this weekend. The Wildcats are expected to decide today whether they'll take on the Big Reds or some other team before closing their season.

The Hornets have a .500 record to date with wins over Mount Hope 6-0, and Oak Hill 13-6, while losing to Beckley 6-0, and a protest game to Rainelle 19-0.

Montgomery's hopes for a victory have been bolstered by the addition of Charles "Tubby" Kinder and Robert "Red" Miller, former Montgomery high and college stars to the Hornets roster. A former Montgomery high school coach, Lofton Tudor, has also been added to the coaching staff of the Hornets.

Everyone attending the game tomorrow will be forced to pay the admission price. Players, coaches, and officials will also pay the admission. The proceeds of the game will be given to the Mother of Jack Sweeney, who performed brilliantly for the Wildcats against the Rainelle entry last Sunday afternoon. The Montgomery team is only taking 25 percent of the proceeds to defray expenses instead of the usual 50 percent.

Undefeated Wildcats Trounce Montgomery
Bruce Passes For Two Touchdowns

Hinton's undefeated Wildcats took one step nearer the conference championship yesterday afternoon by defeating the Montgomery Hornets by the score of 25 to 6.

Despite earlier assumptions that the Wildcats would cop the league crown with a win yesterday, the locals still need a victory over the once beaten Oak Hill eleven to win the title.

The Wildcats scored in every period but the third yesterday, to defeat the better than average Hornets. The first period when Maynard Bruce faded back to the Hinton 48 and heaved a pass into the waiting arms of Bobby Jack Crush on the Montgomery 36, who cut sharply to the left and outran three would-be tacklers to score. Bruce's kick for the point was wide.

The locals tallied again in the second stanza when Jim Hartley intercepted Wilson's pass on the Montgomery 36 and returned the ball to the 14 before two tacklers brought him down. Only two plays later, Bruce again uncorked his passing arm and tossed one into the end zone to Crush for the score.

Tobe Humphries' kick for the point was blocked.

Late in the second period, it was Bruce again who took Darby's punt on the Hinton 34 and ran completely through the Montgomery team to score on a 68-yard return. Phillips kick for point was blocked.

Midway in the fourth stanza, Bruce again spotted Poodie Phillips with a pass on the Montgomery 28 and Phillips fought his way to the five yard stripe, before three tacklers pulled him down. Two plays later, Phillips bowled his way over the payoff stripe from the one yard line for the final Wildcat score. Bruce, standing back in kick formation, passed to Rob Vass for the extra point.

Montgomery's only score was somewhat of a mystery. Osborne had the ball and was around right end, when the ball slipped from his hands and was taken by Wilson in midair who galloped 72 yards into payoff territory. Quarterback Robinson attempted to pass to Chaffin for the point, but the pass was too long.

The Wildcats completely outclassed the visitors in the first down department by making nine to only one for Montgomery.

Elsewhere in the Conference, the Oak Hill entry stopped the Mount Hope Stallions 13 to 6 on the Oak Hill field. The disbanded Beckley Rockets disappointed a large crowd in Richwood, when they failed to show up for the scheduled tussle with Rainelle. The Rainelle eleven won the game by forfeit.

Next Sunday afternoon, the Wildcats journey to Fayette County to meet the Oak Hill eleven in the game that will decide the conference championship.

There has been quite a bit of confusion concerning the status of teams in the Southern West Virginia Football Conference, with the chief misconception being that the Hinton Wildcats clinched the league title with last week's win from Rainelle.

Not so, The Wildcats are tied for first place with the Oak Hill Big Reds. Neither team has been defeated in regular season league play, though Oak Hill dropped on exhibition game. As a matter of fact, one touchdown has been scored against the Big Reds in league play and that, a last-minute desperation tally shoved across by the Mt. Hope Stallions when the two Fayette County teams clashed. Oak Hill won 14-6.

The week end meeting, therefore, Oak Hill and Hinton will decide the league championship. We wouldn't want to frighten the Wildcats, but they're going to find out sooner or later. The Oak Hill roster reads like a list of all-staters of a decade ago. Among the Big Red starters will be big Lowell Rinehart, who used to ragged when he played for Russ parsons' prize elevens. Another is Bobby Cooper, and all-state Oak Hill High School lineman who blocked a Mt. Hope punt last Sunday. Then there is Bob Titlow and Smitty Smith, former Red Devil mainstays, and

Billy Salters, a bullseye passer who tossed one touchdown pitch against the Stallions.

While we're hanging the crepe in this corner, Hank Basham of Fayette Tribune has been doing likewise. Hank has warned the Hilltoppers that the Wildcats will be tough.

In the same column, Basham explained the professional football set-up at Oak Hill, and we gathered that an organization named the Oak Hill Sports Improvement Association is sponsoring the Big Reds.

Here's what Basham had to say: "The subject is semi-pro football to start off with today and we'd like an answer from as many people as possible.

The Oak Hill Big Reds a semi-pro team started this year, having played 4 games to date, this season, two away and two at home. Their record is good, as they've lost but one game. That was a non-league game and they're still tied at the top of the conference with Hinton.

But, even with this record, turnout has been disappointing for the boys and everyone involved.

Now here is what we want to know. Don't you fans like the brand of ball? It's fast, rough and the players are big, in other words, it's knocked-down-drag cut football. Or, is it because the games have been on Sunday afternoon? Still on semi-pro football: This week Hinton comes to Oak Hill for a battle that will decide first place in the semi-pro conference. However, this game will be played Saturday night (at 8pm) There is no high school game this week at the local stadium. (The Red Devils go to Mullens Friday). So, how about turning out and taking a look at this type of football and we're sure you'll like it.

If you want to know who gets the money, then read further;

First, these players must play enough to pay off a \$2,000 debt for uniforms and equipment. After that, the players will divide up a certain amount, then the rest will go for more improvements on the city park and toward other improvements to benefit sports in Oak Hill.

The Sports Improvement association is behind the tam and it is a non-profit organization, so every cent they make off sports events must go back into improvements for the park and if enough is made, it will be applied to new bleachers for the high school.

Championship of the semi-pro Southern West Virginia football circuit was in the hands of the Hinton Wildcats today, with the compliments of wing-footed Malcolm “Flop” Osborne, Wildcat half-back.

Osborne galloped 60 yards with an intercepted pass in the final minutes at Avis park yesterday afternoon to get Hinton a 14-7 decision over a powerful Oak Hill team that knocked at Hinton’s door three times in the last quarter. With the count tied at 7-7 and the Wildcats battling to stave off an enemy touchdown that at times seemed as certain as death and taxes, Osborne pulled down a pass by Lowell Rhinehart, Oak Hill half-back, and scored from his own 40-yard line. There were 28 seconds of the game left when he crossed the goal untouched in the Northeast corner of the field.

The victory, witnessed by an aspiring crowd of perhaps a thousand people, who saw a lively struggle of two hard-hitting lines and two clever backfields, was the fifth in a row for the unbeaten Wildcats. They had previously trimmed Beckley 26-6, Mt. Hope 13-0, Rainelle 20-0, and Montgomery 25-6.

They saw some tough sledding, however, before they put the ball game on ice, Oak Hill’s Big Reds, led by the smashing Rinehart, scored within the first three minutes, putting Hinton behind for the first time this semester. The Wildcats tied the score early in the second period with a 20-yard touchdown play that was combined work of Osborne and Paul Phillips, with Osborne going over for the marker.

Intercepted passes, not only, accounted directly for Hinton's winning touchdown, but also set the stage for the other two scores of the day.

Oak Hill was favored with the first one, After the visitors had kicked off and Bobby Crush had returned the ball to the Hinton 32, the Wildcats picked up five yards in two plays. Then the first pass attempted by Halfback-Coach Maynard Bruce was intercepted by Oak Hill and the enemy began it's drive from the Wildcat 21.

Rinehart, a powerful, long-legged triple threat back from Kingston, smashed through center for three yards and Oak Hill's second biggest threat, a 180-pound right half named Smith, rammed through for seven more and a first down on the Hinton seven. Rinehart scored from there, then plunged for the extra point and Oak Hill was on top, 7-0.

Charley Schrader, Hinton high school coach and the Wildcats' defensive fullback, staged the pass interception that cleared the way for Hinton's first score soon after the second quarter began. Schrader, in fact, plowed all the way down the sideline to the goal line after snatching Salters' pass on the 50 yard string right in front of the Hinton bench., but the officials ruled that he stepped out of bounds on the Oak Hill 32.

From there, Osborne ripped off nine yards over the Big Red left tackle and Phillips bulled through center for a first-down on the 20. On third down, Phillips cut over left tackle to about the 15, was stopped and lateralled to Osborne, who outraced the defenders to the goal line.

Bruce kicked the point. Oak Hill protested that the boot went wide, but the officials' decicission stood and the game was tied up at 7-7 for the next three quarters.

A few minutes later, after a 50-yard ramble by Phillips, Hinton drove to Oak Hill's nine-yard line, only to have a pass intercepted.

In the closing minutes of the third period, Oak Hill began a drive from its own 20 that carried it to the Hinton nine-yard stripe. There the Wildcat forwards, led by Ray Phips, John Wheeler, Rob Vass and Schrader, broke through to smother Salters for ta seven-yard loss. Salters attempted a pass on the next play.

It was partially blocked by Vass and caught by Wheeler. Hinton ran two plays and punted out and the invaders began another goalward drive.

Three consecutive first downs with Rinehart and Smith plunging and Rinehart passing, carried Oak Hill to the Hinton 11, where the Wildcats once again stiffened and held for downs. Hinton took over but lost nine yards on the next play when Bruce juggled the ball and was smothered on his own two-yard ribbon.

A fake kick which turned into a pass from Bruce was dropped by Crush, and on fourth down, standing under his own goal posts, Bruce punted out of bounds on the Oak Hill 48, the ball travelling 50 yards from scrimmage. Oak Hill's first play was the Rinehart pass intercepted by Osborne for the final touchdown. Bruce kicked the ball squarely through the uprights for the point.

First downs totaled Hinton eight, Oak Hill nine.

After the game the Big Reds, coached by a former Oak Hill all-stater, John Duda, asked for a return tussle with the Wildcats at Oak Hill this weekend. Yesterday's game was originally scheduled at Oak Hill on the night of November 6 but was cancelled because of a power failure which blacked out the stadium.

Co-Coach Billy Jo Lilly said the Wildcats will hold a meeting tonight to decide whether they want to play any more games. A playoff has been proposed between the Southern West Virginia Conference champions and South Charleston champions of the Bi-State League.

The half ended 0-0, with Oak Hill intercepting a Hinton pass just as the whistle blew.

Oak Hill got busy in the third quarter and quickly racked up five first downs in a row, the march ending with W. Smith going over for t.d., and Wildcats unable to do much about it.

In the final quarter, the Wildcats bounced back to life and started their own march, which ended in a pass to Bill Scruggs who toted it over. An attempted rush over the line for the extra point was smothered, and it was 6-6, with less than five minutes to go. Oak Hill resorted to the air to recover the lead, but quickly lost the ball on an interception, and the Wildcats unsuccessfully beat towards the goal, but Old Man Time cut them down a little too soon.

Bobby Joe Crush and Bill Scruggs started for Wildcats, while a good catch of a quick low pass over the line by Ratliff at a critical time, did much to etrase two previous failures. W. Smith was the heavy-duty lad for the Oak Hillers.
