Leonard E. Smith, 75 of Pence Springs, WV passed away on Sunday, January 15, 2023 at CAMC Trauma Unit in Charleston, WV of complications from a fall.

He was born on January 2, 1948 in Hinton, WV and was a 1966 graduate of Hinton High School. Leonard was the son of the late Zina C. Smith and Margie L. Allen. He was also preceded in death by his stepfather Grover C. Allen, Jr. and his father and mother-in-law Roy J. and Betty J. Meadows.

He is survived by his wife of almost 55 years, Nancy C. Smith and his son Robert W. Smith and wife Anne-Patrick (Irons) Smith of Lynchburg, VA, along with his grandson Andrew H. Smith, his pride and joy and who is now a freshman at the University of Virginia. He is also survived by his sisters-in-law Mrs. Sandra (Grant, deceased) Serreno, Mrs. Linda (Greg) Snider, and Mrs. Christina (Monty) Hannah as well as a host of extended family members. He had an extensive knowledge of guns, bows and fishing, which he was more than willing to share with customers and friends. He loved to fly fish and at one time was a great fly tier. He loved to tell stories of his fun times with Greg (Toothpick) Lilly and Brian Taylor on Second Creek in Monroe County, not to mention the many times he took a cold dip in Anthony's Creek while fishing with the late Elmer Wykle. Leonard loved spending time hunting on Little Creek in Greenbrier County, first going there as a young man and until his health no longer permitted him to do so.

At Leonard's request his body will be cremated and a gathering of family and friends will be held in late spring.
