We chose as class advisors Miss Lula Noel and Mr. Litsinger; our motto, "Non scholae sed vitae discimus"; our colors, blue and gold; our flower, the blue violet. The year has just begun, but we feel that with the help of our able class advisors and our officers, our Junior year will be a very enjoyable one. This year we are given a more important place on THE DART Staff. We shall try to contribute any worth-while effort that we may.

ASPIRATION—We, the Juniors, aspire to be learned and dignified Seniors; to produce a Senior play and publish a DART as well as our predecessors, and last of all, to accomplish whatever we undertake to the best of our ability.

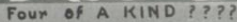
Dorothy Daly will represent the Greenbrier District in the State Tournament at Morgantown, which will be held some time in the near future. We are sure that she will receive honors.
