


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
Looking Back at Yesterday, Reaching for Tomorrow


Flames ignite Homecoming '93













Homecoming Through the Years







Natural helpers are chosen through an anonymous schoolwide survey. They receive at least thirty hours training in a retreat setting. They are trained in how to improve their helping skills, how to contact helping resources when problems exceed their skills, and how to better care for themselves. Natural helpers are also reminded that they are not professionally trained therapists or counselors.

After the Retreat Training students attend ongoing training either in a semester class or a less structured format – where they explore topics of concern to students; such as chemical dependency, sexual abuse, stress, etc.






93 Golf: Swinging their way to 4th place!














Bobcats steal Sectionals.


