Death of Mrs. Tandy

Shortly after we went to press Wednesday afternoon, word came of the death of Mrs. E. M. Tandy, of Keyser, in a hospital at that place. She entered the institution several weeks ago for an appendix operation, but a serious kidney ailment followed the surgical treatment and she died at 2 o, clock that afternoon.

Mrs. Tandy was the former Miss Annivieve Quisenberry, oldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. V. Quisenberry, of Ballengee street, Hinton. She was a native of Cliff Top, Fayette county, but was brought to Hinton by her parents when she was a small child. She was married to Mr. Tandy in 1917, and they resided here until 1921 when they moved to Princeton. Mr. Tandy was employed here and at Princeton as funeral director for the Meadows Furniture Co. Later they resided in Huntington for two years, and moved to Keyser where they have resided for a number of years, Mr. Tandy being a funeral director in that city.

Mrs. Tandy was a graduate of the Hinton high school and taught in the Hinton schools before her marriage. She was a member of the Eastern Star and the Keyser Presbyterian church. She was a most estimable woman and greatly beloved by a wide circle of friends. She was 40 years of age.

Besides her husband, she is survived by one son, Edwin Tandy, Jr., and one daughter, Catherine Tandy. Also surviving are four brothers, Ray Quisenberry, of Chicago, Ill., James, of Hinton, George and Randolph Quisenberry, of Charleston; and three sisters, Miss Elizabeth Quisenberry and Mrs. Fannie Johnson, of Hinton, and Miss Isabelle Quisenberry, of Cumberland, Md.

The remains of Mrs. Tandy were brought to Hinton for the final rites and at 11 o'clock, Saturday morning funeral services were conducted by Rev. J.F. Atkins, pastor of the First Christian church, from the home. The interment was in Hill Top cemetery.
